



G-12 Progress Report through September 2021

- G-12's represent delegated authority to make adjustments (increases or decreases) to project funding.
- Through September 2021, Caltrans has processed the following changes:
 - SHOPP: Approximately \$31 million in increases from 29 projects, and \$62 million in savings from 50 projects.
 - STIP: \$1 million in increases from two projects, and \$437,600 in savings from one project.

Federal Funding Update

- The President signed into law the \$1.2 trillion Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act on November 15, 2021.
- Reauthorizes surface transportation programs for five years (Federal Fiscal Year 2022 through 2026).
- \$550 billion in new spending in addition to regular annual spending on infrastructure.
 - Includes \$110 billion in new spending for roads and bridges
- Creates new competitive transportation grant programs and increases funding for existing competitive programs.



Federal Funding Update – California

- California is estimated to receive the following formula funding over the next five years:
 - \$25.7 billion Federal-aid highway apportionment
 - New Programs EV Infrastructure, Carbon Reduction and PROTECT
 - \$4.2 billion (New) Bridge replacement and repair
 - \$9.45 billion Public Transportation
- Federal-aid highway funds has traditionally been split approximately 60/40 between the state and local transportation agencies.
