Subject: DRAFT 2025 ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM FUND ESTIMATE

SUMMARY:

The California Department of Transportation (Department) will present to the California Transportation Commission (Commission) the Draft 2025 Active Transportation Program (ATP) Fund Estimate, as an Information Item, at the Commission's January 2024 meeting. The Department will continue to work with Commission staff to finalize the 2025 ATP Fund Estimate, which is scheduled to be presented for adoption at the Commission's March 2024 meeting.

BACKGROUND:

The 2025 ATP Fund Estimate capacity is based on Senate Bill (SB) 99 (Statutes of 2013), Assembly Bill (AB) 101 (Statutes of 2013), and SB 1 (Statutes of 2017), along with the Federal Highway Administration, Commission, and California State Transportation Agency guidance.

The ATP, as articulated in SB 99 and AB 101, replaced the existing system of small, dedicated grant programs, which funded Safe Routes to Schools, bicycle programs, and Recreational Trails. The intent of combining this funding was to improve flexibility and reduce the administrative burden of having several small, independent grant programs. SB 1 created the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Program to address deferred maintenance on the state highway as well as on local streets and roads. The Department has consulted with Commission staff during the development of the Draft 2025 ATP Fund Estimate.
