My name is Tristen Miller and I am writing to you today on behalf of Strong Towns Santa Barbara, a group founded to work closely with local officials to promote and enact policy which embodies urban planning principles necessary for resilient and financially sustainable city design. Since we began in 2023, we've brought together over 400 locals to help make Santa Barbara more resilient, fiscally sound, and people-oriented — one step at a time.

I am writing in support of SBCAG's and Caltrans' joint funding applications to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for Cycle 4 of the Senate Bill 1 (SB1) Competitive Programs for completion of the Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor project (Project).

This is the final phase of an ongoing effort to improve mobility in the corridor between Ventura and Santa Barbara Counties, which was supported by 80% of Santa Barbara County voters who are investing \$140 million in local sales tax funding. The Project helps to protect the economic viability, quality of life, and environmental sustainability of the region and the state by providing multiple transportation benefits that provides a safe transportation network, reduces congestion on U.S. 101, improves interregional goods movement, increases multimodal access, and creates access to jobs.

- Expansion of transit, including the purchase of three zero-emission buses for the Ventura County Transportation Commission Coastal Express bus, and improving commuter rail service from Los Angeles to Ventura, will enhance public transportation services along the corridor and will help achieve a balanced set of transportation, environmental, and community access improvements.
- Serves Disadvantaged Communities in Santa Barbara and Ventura Counties. The
 completion of the project will address various needs of the disadvantaged and
 low-income communities in Santa Barbara and Ventura counties. With the
 carpool lane addition, low-income households who rely on bus transit will benefit
 from the anticipated travel time savings. Additional components of the project
 include a series of bicycle and pedestrian safety enhancements in Santa Barbara's
 Eastside disadvantaged community to help reconnect communities in the
 corridor.
- Meets State Greenhouse Reduction Goals by increasing active transportation options. The project will also install Zero Emission Vehicle charging stations along the corridor to accelerate the adoption of ZEV use and promote sustainability and reduced impacts on the environment.
- Strong partnerships exist to complete these projects. Partnering organizations include SBCAG, Caltrans, California Transportation Commission, Cities of Santa Barbara and Carpinteria, County of Santa Barbara, as well as the communities of Montecito and Summerland.

We support this grant application and project for the multi-modal zero emission projects included in the grant application. These include:

- New sidewalks along Cabrillo Blvd beneath the 101 Freeway
- Extension of the Coastal Trail with a Multi-use path along Cabrillo Blvd beneath the 101 Freeway
- Bicycle and pedestrian safety enhancements in Santa Barbara's Eastside
- ZEV charging infrastructure at the East Cabrillo parking lot
- Three ZEV busses for VCTC
- Replacement of an old rail bridge to allow for future double tracking

It is important to note that one of the key components of Strong Towns philosophy, both locally and nationally, is the <u>end of freeway widenings</u> and expansions. Though this project includes a new HOV lane rather than just a simple widening, we believe the benefits of this widening are unclear. However, we support this grant because of the many multimodal projects included in the request, and hope to see similar projects being funded in our region going forward—without any freeway widenings.

We firmly believe the Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor project makes a significant impact for residents and businesses in Santa Barbara County, Central Coast region, State of California, and beyond. For these reasons, we strongly support SBCAG and Caltrans' Senate Bill 1, Cycle 4 grant application and urge your full consideration of this application.

We strongly support the CTC staff recommendations and urge the Commission to approve funding for the Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor at their June 26, 2025 meeting.

The Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) is pleased to share our strong support for the adoption of the **Watsonville - Santa Cruz Multimodal Corridor Program (WSC-MCP) Cycle 4 Project** and we urge you to adopt the staff recommendation for funding this important project.

The transformative Watsonville-Santa Cruz Multimodal Corridor Program provides congestion relief and reduces transit travel times; reduces single occupancy vehicle miles traveled (VMT) and increases bus ridership, biking and walking; advances transportation equity; improves roadway safety for all users; and better connects Santa Cruz County to communities on the Central Coast and in the San Francisco Bay Area.

The innovative bus on shoulder facility will improve transit on-time performance and reliability by allowing zero-emission buses to bypass congestion and operate on the outside shoulder and on auxiliary lanes on Highway 1. This will also facilitate the expansion of express bus service and the creation of two new "rapid" routes for Santa Cruz Metropolitan Transit District's (METRO) regional route network between Watsonville and Santa Cruz. METRO regional routes provide vital coverage because they serve the transportation disadvantaged community of Watsonville and connect its residents to educational, healthcare, and job centers in Aptos, Capitola, and Santa Cruz and serve the low-income unincorporated communities of Live Oak and Seacliff. The highway component of this project is the final phase of a three-phase operational improvement program with 2-miles of improvements completed and another 3 miles under construction.

The project will build a 1.25-mile segment of the iconic 32-mile Coastal Rail Trail, including four pedestrian/bicycle overcrossings to reconnect communities divided by major barriers including Highway 1, Soquel Drive, and major waterways. Finally, the project also includes critical improvements to the major arterial Soquel Drive that parallels Highway 1 serving Cabrillo Community College, neighborhood schools, commercial centers, grocery stores, both the county's hospitals, other medical facilities, and other key destinations. The cycle 4 project includes enhancements to METRO bus service by installing new in-lane boarding platforms, shelters, real-time bus arrival displays, and ticket validators. METRO's rapid but routes will

receive transit signal priority devices at signalized intersections, as well as active transportation upgrades on Soquel Drive that will close sidewalk gaps, construct ADA ramps and curb extensions, and install separated bicycle facilities and high visibility treatments. The Rapid routes connect all the Opportunity Areas between Watsonville and Santa Cruz, and their two termini are sites of new 100% affordable housing projects.

This project closely aligns with local, regional, state, and federal climate action and resiliency goals and will improve safety, increase mobility, reduce congestion, and enhance the quality of life for residents, students, and visitors. We are pleased to support this work and thank you for your consideration of adopting this important project.

Senate Bill 1 Competitive Programs Staff Recommendations – Letter of Support RE:

Dear Chair Grisby:

On June 6, the California Transportation Commission (CTC) staff released its recommendations for the proposed programming of three Senate Bill 1 (SB1) competitive programs: the Solutions for Congested Corridors (SCC) Program, Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP), and Local Partnership Competitive Program (LPP-C). The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) offers its strong support for the project lists proposed by CTC staff. MTC thanks the CTC staff for their hard work and believes their recommendations represent a balanced list of projects that considers state goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions, enhancing traveler and goods movement connectivity, and promoting alternative transportation over single-occupant vehicles.

MTC and our Bay Area partners took a comprehensive approach to select the region's nominations for the SCC and TCEP programs. The approach included the adoption of prioritization principles that promote early project delivery and advance state and regional goals. MTC used these principles to select and rank, where appropriate, project nominations to forward to the CTC. All recommended projects are consistent with and further the goals of Plan Bay Area 2050, the Bay Area's current Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy.

Myrna Melgar The 11 Bay Area projects recommended for SB1 funding will leverage significant federal, regional, and local investments, reflecting a diverse set of goals aimed at improving mobility, safety, sustainability, and economic vitality. The recommended Bay Area projects are:

- The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency's (SFMTA) Train Control Upgrade Project Phase 1 will modernize the entire SFMTA light rail "Muni Metro" system with Communications-Based Train Control technology. The \$41 million in SCC funds will complete the funding plan for the first phase and leverage \$114 million in federal, local, and other state funding. Construction is scheduled to begin in fiscal year 2026-2027.
- The San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART) Silicon Valley Phase 2 Extension, led by the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA), is a regionally transformative project that will extend the BART rail system by six miles through downtown San José to the City of Santa Clara. The \$75 million in SCC and \$25 million in LPP-C funds will complete the funding plan, leveraging \$1.5 billion in other state funds and \$375 million in Regional Measure 3 toll funding for the project. Construction can begin in fiscal year 2025-2026.

- The Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit District (SMART) Healdsburg Extension Project will
 extend rail and pathway from 5.5 miles from Windsor to Healdsburg in Sonoma County. The \$62
 million in SCC and \$25 million in LPP-C funds will complete the funding plan, leveraging \$106
 million in other federal, state, and regional sources. Construction can begin in fiscal year 20252026.
- Alameda County Transportation Commission's (ACTC) Rail Safety Enhancement Program, Phase A, will construct much-needed safety improvements at 24 at-grade railroad crossings and two trespass prevention locations in Alameda County. The \$30 million in TCEP funds will complete the funding plan, and construction can begin in fiscal year 2025-2026.
- The I-680/SR-4 Interchange Improvements project will extend and widen the southbound I-680 ramp, add a ramp metering system (Phase 2A), and construct a new direct connector from southbound I-680 to eastbound SR-4 (Phase 4) in Contra Costa County. The \$58 million in TCEP funds will complete the funding plan for the project and leverage \$210 million in Regional Measure 3 toll funding. Construction can begin in fiscal year 2025-2026.
- The US-101/SR-84 Interchange Reimagined project in San Mateo County will reconstruct the interchange to improve traffic flow, freight access, and safety by eliminating a 5-leg intersection. The \$14 million in TCEP funds will be dedicated to the construction phase, which is expected to begin in fiscal year 2026-2027.
- The State Route 37 Sears Point to Mare Island Improvement Project, Phase 2, will support multimodal travel, decrease traffic congestion, increase freight throughput, enhance safety, and improve corridor environmental resilience in Napa, Solano, and Sonoma counties. The \$73 million in TCEP funds will be dedicated to the construction phase and is expected to begin in fiscal year 2026-2027.
- The TCEP funding recommendations also include awards for three Caltrans-nominated projects: the Prologis Mobility Freight Logistics Electrifications for Emission-Free Transport Project (\$15 million TCEP); Forum Mobility Beyond the Dock: Heavy-Duty Electrification of the Port of Oakland Priority Trade Corridors Project (\$3 million TCEP); and the Accelerating Zero Emission Fleet Charging on Priority Freight Corridors project in Oakland (\$6 million TCEP), which is a part of the larger Gage Zero program.
- LPP-C funding recommendations include awards for three Bay Area projects. Two projects are also recommended in the SCC program: the BART to Silicon Valley Phase II Extension in Santa Clara County (\$25 million LPP-C) and the SMART Healdsburg Extension in Sonoma County (\$25 million LPP-C). The third award will complete the funding plan for the SFMTA's Howard Streetscape Project in San Francisco (\$14 million LPP-C).

While not all Bay Area nominated projects were recommended for funding due to requests far exceeding limited available resources, the CTC staff recommendations strike a good balance among transportation needs, environmental sensitivities, and geographic considerations. MTC appreciates your staff's collaboration and dedication in developing program guidelines through an open and inclusive process, as well as in evaluating all nominations fairly following the program guidelines.

MTC looks forward to working with project sponsors, the Commission, and Caltrans to deliver these critical transportation improvement projects across the San Francisco Bay Area region. The Santa Barbara County Air Pollution Control District (District) supports the California Transportation Commission (CTC) staff recommendation to program \$134 million in Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) Cycle 4 funding to complete the Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor project. The Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor is the number one regional priority for the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments (SBCAG) in partnership with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). The U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor project is an important project for our region and, if funded, with the inclusion of multimodal transportation and zero emission components, will support the District's mission of protecting the people and the environment of Santa Barbara County from the effects of air pollution.

The improvements included in this project consist of a first-of-its-kind High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lane in the Central Coast, while also providing funding for the Cabrillo Boulevard Rail, Bicycle, and Pedestrian Improvements, Santa Barbara Eastside Active Transportation Improvements, electric bus replacements for Ventura County Transportation Commission, and electric vehicle (EV) charging stations in Santa Barbara. The project will reduce congestion and greenhouse gas emissions while improving transit reliability. The Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor is a transformative interregional project that is aligned with state climate and equity goals and will provide needed congestion relief to the more than 100,000 Californians who travel the corridor between Santa Barbara and Ventura County. In addition to mitigating climate change, the project will also bring other positive air quality benefits to our community by reducing harmful air pollutants, such as ozone precursor emissions, particulate matter (PM), and toxic air contaminants. Mobile sources are outside of the District's regulatory authority, making it all the more important to leverage funding sources such as SB 1 funding to help reduce onroad emissions and promote zero emission vehicle expansion throughout the region. Santa Barbara County is designated nonattainment for the State's PM₁₀ standard and nonattainment-transitional for the State's ozone standard, which highlights the importance of projects like this to help reduce emissions and protect public health.

For these reasons, we support the CTC staff recommendation and urge the Commission to approve funding for the Santa Barbara U.S. 101 Multimodal Corridor at their June 26, 2025 meeting. We look forward to the benefits that this project will bring to the region in terms of reducing air pollution, supporting active transportation, improving transit reliability, and accelerating the transition to zero emission technology.
