- Required long-range (20-year) plan
- Updated every 5 years
- Must meet various federal and state requirements
- Guides high-level transportation planning
- Includes recommendations

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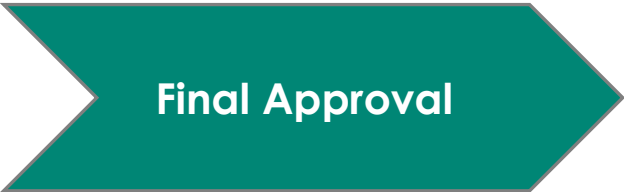

CTP Goals

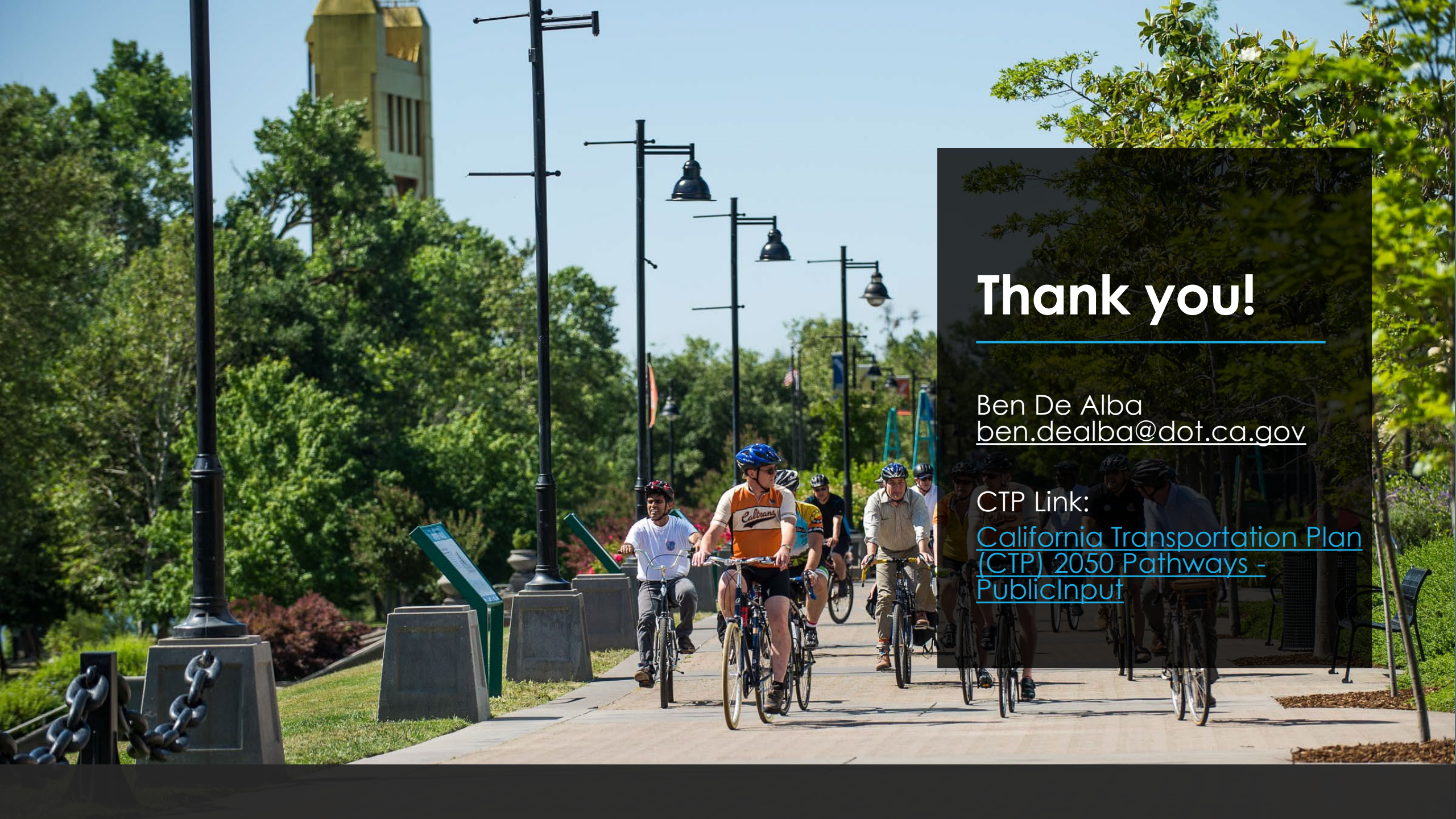
CTP Key Points

- CTP Strategies can help achieve greenhouse gas and vehicle miles travelled reduction goals.
- Collaboration, especially with MPOs and RTPAs, is vital to meeting CTP goals.
- New revenue sources are needed.
- Solutions are rarely one-size-fits-all.
- The interregional system is vital for emergency response and recovery.
