California Transportation Commission publishes 2022 Annual Report *Report estimates over 80,000 jobs created from state transportation investments*

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – The California Transportation Commission today released its 2022 Annual Report to the Legislature announcing that, during Fiscal Year 2021-22, it allocated \$7.5 billion to transportation projects throughout the state, creating an estimated 80,000 jobs.

“Collectively these projects will repair roads, restore bridges, reduce congestion, improve goods movement, and make our streets safer for bicyclists and pedestrians,” said Chair Lee Ann Eager. “This continues our work to ensure California has an equitable, sustainable, safe, and efficient transportation system that supports economic growth,”

The report also highlights policy changes made by the Commission over the last year to further advance state transportation goals. For example, the Commission approved a new policy encouraging more freight projects to incorporate zero-emission truck charging stations to reduce air pollution and help combat climate change.

The report further includes recommendations to the Legislature for the upcoming year, including to increase funding for the Active Transportation Program by \$1 billion per year. This program is the state’s only dedicated funding source for walking and biking projects, and as a result, it is severely oversubscribed. The program received a \$1 billion one-time augmentation in the 2022-23 State Budget but the need for an ongoing funding increase remains.

The California Transportation Commission is an independent state agency responsible for funding the construction of highway, local road, passenger rail, transit, bicycling, and pedestrian projects. The Commission also advises the Secretary of Transportation and the Legislature on state transportation policies and plans.
