

SB 125: Origin and Overview

Transit is critical to California's climate and equity goals, yet ridership has been falling since even before the pandemic.

- SB125 provided short-term funding for transit agencies as they continue to recover from the pandemic
- SB125 also established the TTTF to "grow transit ridership, improve the transit experience and address long-term operational needs."
- Transformation is a key word: goal is to not only reverse falling ridership, but to exceed pre-COVID ridership dramatically to meet goals like reducing VMT by 30% by 2045
- Report due to Legislature in Oct 2025






Overview of 2025 workplan and timelines





Draft Vision Statement

- Increase options for living, working, and learning near high-quality transit routes
- Deliver an exceptional customer experience with a strong focus on safety for all
- Ensure transit is operationally and financially sustainable with consistent investment

June 2025 (Postponed) Transit Transformational Task Force Meeting – Discussion Item

Focus Area: Boost the speed, frequency, and reliability of transit services

Potential topics for TTTF consider:

Topic Area: Transit Prioritization

- Strategy A: Standardize, support, and scale transit priority infrastructure
- Strategy B: Expedite delivery of transit-supportive infrastructure and strategies
- Strategy C: Coordinate and collaborate to deliver infrastructure across jurisdictions
- Strategy D: Establish flexibility with State funding sources

Topic Area: First- and Last-Mile Access to Transit

- Strategy JJ: Reform planning process to improve access to transit
- Strategy KK: Ensure consistent and flexible funding for active transportation and first- and last- mile access to transit
- Strategy LL: Coordinate and collaborate to provide first- and last- mile access to transit across jurisdictions.

June 2025 (Postponed) Transit Transformational Task Force Meeting Discussion Item

Focus Area: Deliver an exceptional customer experience with a strong focus on safety for all

Potential topics for TTTF to consider:

Topic Area: Safe and Clean Environment for Passengers and Operators

- Strategy J: Implement physical security measures for frontline transit workers and riders
- Strategy K: Improve coordination with H&HS Agencies to ensure comprehensive health-related safety and security responses
- Strategy L: Ensure coordination at the State level between agencies
- Strategy M: Provide dedicated safety and security funding.

Topic Area: Accessible Transportation and the Transit Needs of Older Adults and Persons with Disabilities

- Strategy MM: Coordinate paratransit services efficiently between transit agencies and non-profit, private, and healthcare providers
- Strategy NN: Develop customer-facing and backend tools to improve the process of booking and dispatch of rides
- Strategy OO: Improve accessibility of transit stops for all riders
- Strategy PP: Reform planning process for paratransit
- Strategy QQ: Explore options to improve funding mechanisms for paratransit

June 2025 (Postponed) Transit Transformational Task Force Meeting Discussion Item

Task Force considerations on Appendix A: Detailed Analysis requested under Senate Bill 125

Areas of Discussion for TTTF:

- 1. The services provided by transit agencies and the demographics of transit ridership, with detail on services provided, including persons with disabilities, or specific populations like low-income individuals and students.
- 2. Existing funding sources for transit with a breakdown of funding available for capital and operations
- 3. The use of moneys from local transportation funds for other modes, such as streets and roads.
- 4. The cost to operate, maintain, and provide for the future growth of transit systems for the next 10 years.
- 5. The costs and operational impacts associated with federal, state, and local mandates, including, but not limited to, the ADA and the State Air Resources Board's Innovative Clean Transit regulations
- 6. Workforce recruitment, retention, and development challenges, impacting transit service.
- 7. Existing policies on state and local metrics to measure transit performance.
- 8. Information on how transit agencies modified their services in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting drop in ridership and revenue.
- 9. The division of transit funding between capital and operations.
