



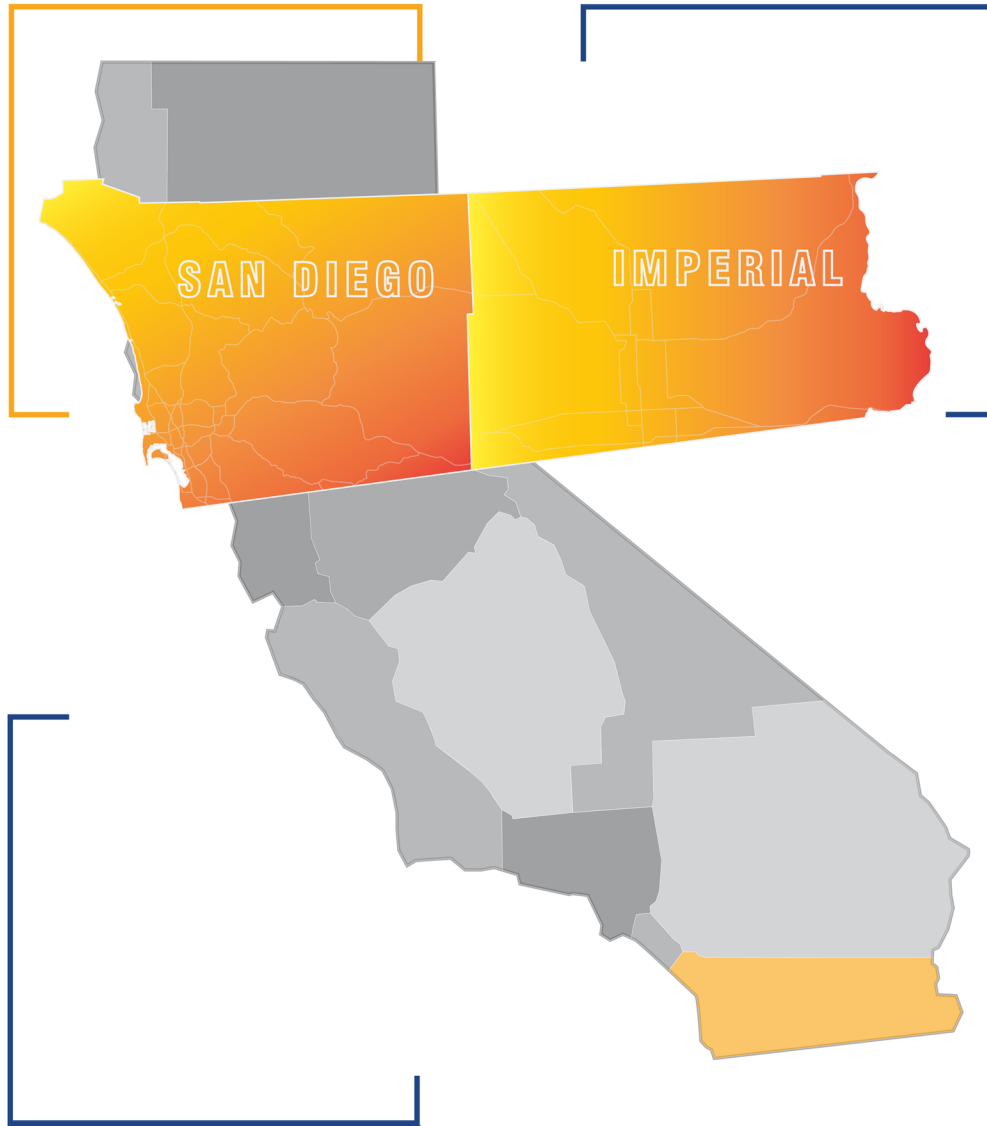

CAB Purpose & Overview: Centering Community Voice



Community, Tribal Inclusion & Representation

In this pilot year, CAB is being intentionally designed to embed community and Tribal Nation perspectives early in districtwide decision-making.

The structure and recruitment approach aim to build a board that reflects diverse sectors including education, health, government, business, disability access, and Tribal partners.



Two-Way Communication, Equity & Transparency

CAB is being developed to create a two-way dialogue, where Caltrans shares mandates and members surface local priorities and insights.

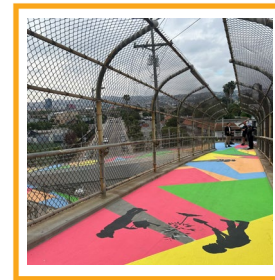
As the pilot grows, CAB aims to support early problem-solving, alignment on equity measures, and greater transparency that strengthens trust with communities and Tribal Nations.

How the CAB Advances D11's People & Communities First Action Plan

A core component of D11's 2025–2028 People & Communities First commitments

A Direct PC1AP Action

District 11 explicitly committed to establishing the CAB as one of its People & Communities First equity actions for the 2025–2028 cycle, making the CAB a core part of how the district operationalizes statewide equity goals.



Supporting Ongoing Learning & Improvement

The CAB gives the district a consistent space to gather insight, refine processes, and report progress through PC1AP's statewide systems.

Strengthening Internal Alignment Across Divisions

PC1AP requires equity actions that bridge divisions. The CAB fulfills this by bringing in subject matter experts from every division, modeling the collaborative, cross-functional approach to transportation planning.



Creating a Pathway to Statewide Equity Leadership

The CAB serves as a preparation ground for future participation in the statewide EAC, helping members learn state processes and engage in broader policy conversations.

How District 11 Works Together to Support the CAB

Supported by Three Key Divisions: Administration, External Affairs, and Planning and directed by the Executive Steering Committee

Administration Division: Ensures smooth, safe, and accessible CAB operations by coordinating logistics such as room bookings and meeting setup.

External Affairs Division: Provides equity leadership ensuring CAB processes align with the People & Communities First approach and statewide equity goals.

Planning Division: Supports ongoing engagement through the CAB Hub and connects CAB input to planning and early project development.

Executive Steering Committee: Overseen by District Director Ann Fox, Chief Deputy Capital Principal Allan Kosup, and Chief Deputy Capital Maintenance and Operations Gerard Chadergian, the Executive Steering Committee ensures the CAB's work stays aligned with district priorities and overall strategic direction.
