2024 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Fact Sheet¹

The Tuolumne County Transportation Council (TCTC) is a joint powers agency and designated as the regional transportation planning agency for the Tuolumne County Region. Every two years, the TCTC prepares a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) which programs Tuolumne County Regional Improvement Program (RIP) funding for transportation projects in the Tuolumne County Region. The RTIP is prepared based on the priorities identified in the Regional Transportation Plan, a federally mandated master transportation plan which guides the Region's transportation investments over a 20–25-year period. The RTP is updated every 4-5 years.

The TCTC works closely with their partner agencies, the County, City of Sonora and Caltrans in the preparation of the RTP. In addition, the TCTC conducts an extensive public participation process throughout the development of the RTP and updates to obtain maximum public input in identifying the priorities of the Region.

The current, top priority project is the Jamestown Safe, Healthy, and Equitable Streets Improvement Project. The PA&ED Phase for this project is estimated to begin 7/01/2025 and wrap up 6/12/2026.

Benefits

The projects programmed in the 2024 RTIP focus on advancing the Region and the State through improving traffic flow by possibly widening the road in the project location to 5 lanes, adding safety elements through widening shoulders and constructing a Class I Multi-Use Path, promoting transit ridership through the construction of new transit stops, encouraging ridesharing through a new Park & Ride facility, and promoting EV usage through the construction of public chargers. The 2024 RTIP also ensures continual guidance of planning, programming, and monitoring projects. The regional and statewide benefits of the RTIP will take the form of increased operational efficiencies, a reduction of traffic congestion and enhancement of pedestrian, transit, automobile mobility and access.
